Over the last few months we have been studying why the mainline churches, particularly the United Methodist Church, have been losing members, specifically African American members. African American membership is 2% of the overall membership (2% of 8 million, or 160,000).

Now there might be a variety of reasons why the United Methodist Church as a denomination has been losing members, but the reasons for individual local churches losing or gaining members tend to be specific, such as:

a. Lack of Vision:

Local church leaders and members are responsible for developing and articulating the vision for their local church. In some denominations, the Pastor takes the lead in developing the church vision. However, in the United Methodist Church, because of the "Itinerant ministry" system, that is, Methodist ministers are subject to appointment at a new church every year, if

the local church followed the "Vision" of each new pastor, things could become quite confusing.

b. Vision Fundamentals:

One of the fundamental qualities that the vision must have is Love of self. That is, the local church members must Love, Comfort, Care for, Respect, Support and try to Understand each other.

We all seek support in one form or another. It might be Emotional (love, understanding, encouragement, validation, comforting, etc). We as a church must provide these fundamental qualities for each other. If we do, we will grow and prosper. When we have these qualities, we will tell our friends and neighbors who "live their daily lives in quiet desperation" where they can find solace, and they in turn will tell others.

By the way, these are all biblical principles. This fundamental quality may seem selfish, but remember, before you can help any one you must help yourself.

Pushing the Comfort Zone

Although as Christians we know that Jesus commands us to witness on His behalf, many of us find that act to be way out of our comfort zone if it includes witnessing to strangers. The idea of going up to someone's door and telling them that God loves them just seems too difficult. The situation is not helped any by our experiences with certain religious witnessing groups that often come around neighborhoods knocking on doors, bearing tracts and promoting their own brand of religion.

The NOW (Nurture, Outreach, Witness) committee at Middlebrook has a plan of neighborhood witnessing, the "Shine Our Light Ministry," that is simple and less intrusive than our experience with those "other" groups. It involves carrying a small gift with some Christian meaning, introducing ourselves as from Middlebrook and simply telling people that God loves them. If they want to know more we invite them to the church, otherwise we wish them a good day and move on. The gift has been a candle and a small card with the church name and address and scripture reminding us that "Christ is the Light of the World". The Saturday before this past Easter we went out carrying the gift of a small cross and a card bearing scripture (John 11: 25-26) and the message that "Christ died for you".

I feel very uneasy about going up to a stranger's door and even bringing the simplest message of God's love, but pushing past the fears, I found the reward to be great. Often times we were greeted with skepticism, but once they understood we were not selling something and our "free gift" was really free (as is God's Grace), we were most often greeted with a smile or a thank you. I invite you to join us the next time we go out. You might find that going a little beyond your comfort zone with Jesus as your guide brings great joy.
